**MEMORANDUM TO DEAN PAUL DEAN  
DEAN KEN PYE**

**Re: Federal Bar Association**

In the following I would like to report on the development of the next joint program with the Federal Bar Association.

Last week a meeting took place in the Federal Bar Building. The following gentlemen participated: Conrad Philos, Philip Anram, two representatives of the Bureau of National Affairs and Werner Kronstein.

It has been decided to prepare the next program for the beginning of September 1963. The briefing conference is going to be devoted to tariff problems in the following fields: (1) coal-oil, (2) agricultural products, (3) finished products exemplified by products to be selected.

The program is going to be prepared by special committees. Werner is a member of the committee on coal and oil. I am going to be kept informed and try to bring the European partners into the conference. This conference is to be prepared entirely different from the Patent Conference. It is known to you that at the Patent Conference we would only prevent a number of especially bad developments, but the conference was not influenced positively by us to any sufficient extent. Therefore I insisted that we will have a decisive word to say in regard to the September conference.

We invited Jack Kennedy to cooperate in the preparation of this conference because of the Japanese textile problem. Jack just returned from Japan and has a very good knowledge of the field.

Conrad Philos asked me to suggest a European expert in the fields of government patents for his briefing conference on government patents. I run into serious difficulties in finding a proper man who will be here in May since no special expenses are paid by the Association.

I am going to present to you another memorandum suggesting a method by virtue of which the executive board of our Institute can be utilized in the representation of Georgetown Law Center in the work with the Federal Bar Association.
