Dear Dave :

Detroit unfortunately is rather far away from here and it is not possible just to drop in; therefore I realize that I have to leave Washington once more for Frankfurt without having seen you. We were here since February, and I am going to Frankfurt to teach there during the winter term and shall be back on February 8, 1958, to teach the spring term here. I wish to give you a report on our work by letter.

Finally we have established the Institute for International Law within the Georgetown Law School. A few days ago, the University gave an honorary doctor's degree to my German friend Schulte zur Hausen who financed our Institute. It is rather possible that our small financial basis will be considerably enlarged during the next month. In spite of our modest financial basis we are going to publish our first volume in March 1958. The book is called American Antitrust Law and the Application and Effects Abroad. Furthermore the Institute published two articles, one of which appeared in the Journal of the Patent Office, and the other one is going to appear in the next number of the Columbia Law Review. Both are written by Institute people, graduate students.

Our Institute is closely connected with the Frankfurt Institute, and we expect rather important contributions to come up. Since I have a number of American and German assistants, the whole matter becomes independent from my person; that is necessary. I too am going to withdraw from some of my teaching obligations here and limit my teaching on Corporation Law and Trade Regulation in the spring term, while I expect to have seminars whenever I am here.

Your Law Journal should be a little lenient with me. It is no doubt that in the scope of our present work an article will come along - but time is the essence. Please, be assured that I am going to become regular contributor to your excellent paper, every issue of which I read. I was proud to realize that the last issue came so close to our joint work, since it reported on your cooperation with Mr. Freeman in the Arnold Office.

Kate is alright; she is coming with me and accepts our rather difficult life with good humor. Karl^M Martin has his first teaching job in Reed College, Oregon, where he will stay for one year. Then he will take a more permanent job. Werner is a fullfledged attorney in the Office Arnold, Fortas & Porter where he works with Milton Freeman. He was very successful as law clerk of Judge Fahey.

All in all, I can report that I have not been without success.
