Dear Frank:

Attached hereto you will find the Institute's budget for the year 1960/61. This budget follows the one approved for the year 1959/60.

At this point, I believe I should point out certain decisions taken by the Institute's Executive Committee at its last meeting, which relate to the Institute's activities for the coming year. It will be necessary to have one American research assistant for the entire period 1960/61. I plan to extend the employment of John A. Kennedy, Jr., to September 15, 1960, and intend to employ James A. Nelson from September 15, 1960, to July, 1961.

Mr. Nelson will be discharged this summer from the U.S. Army, where he has served with the Judge Advocate General's office for the last three years. He has agreed to accept a position as research assistant to the Institute. He is, I believe, well known to you. He graduated from Georgetown Law Center in 1956, and from 1956 to 1957 clerked for A. Barrett Prettyman, now Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia. Mr. Nelson was one of the best students in his class at the Law Center and is well qualified to fill the position which he has accepted.

With respect to the funds available under the Ford Foundation grant, it is important to emphasize that the Institute's research fellows are not faculty employees within the meaning of the General Faculty Constitution. They do not acquire tenure, and the period of the employment with the Institute is not counted in the acquisition of tenure. On the other hand, their appointment is not subject to the approval of the Faculty Executive Committee or of

the Research Fellow Committee. They are, rather, engaged and employed at the discretion of the Director of the Institute, subject to the approval of the Dean of the Law School Graduate Division and of the President of the University.

In Mr. Schulte sur Hausen's letter of February 25, 1959, it was stated that "the Georgetown Law Center will contribute not less than Six Thousand Dollars a year toward the maintenance of the Institute for International and Foreign Trade Law at Georgetown Law Center. Georgetown's contribution will consist of a Six Thousand Dollar cash contribution, and also housing for the Institute, books and maintenance of the library, necessary secretarial service, telephone, and supplies, all contributed without charges to the Institute" [p.2] The present budget has been drawn up in terms of this undertaking.

Since I would like to give this budget to the Ford Foundation, the Institute credited Georgetown with everything spent in connection with my professorship. It will prove to be helpful if the budget is a little bit impressive as far as the contribution of the University is concerned.

I should like to use this opportunity to call your attention to the fact that it has proved quite difficult to obtain a refund for money spent in purchasing books in Germany, despite the fact that the amount expended is within the amount approved in the budget. A sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) is still owing; and it will be necessary to purchase more books for research and study in preparation for the Energy Conference.

If the application for a Ford Foundation grant is approved, we must draw up a new budget. In the meanwhile, it is important that we be able to show the Ford Foundation that this budget has been approved without the Foundation's participation, and that the status of the Institute within the Faculty and University is guaranteed.
