Dear Father McGrath:

Today I am pleased to inform you that the Frankfurt Institute transferred to Georgetown University the equivalent of DM 12,350.-- for the credit of the Institute for International and Foreign Trade Law (Acc. 3 180 021). This sum arises from an opinion prepared by our Institutes for the "Bundesverband der Deutschen Industrie". This amount is already included in the budget for 1964/65.

The board of advisors for the Washington Institute has established three committees to prepare the next steps. The committee under Mr. Milton Freeman and Mr. Jack Murphy will deal with American funds. Professor John Miller, Mr. Kandler and Mr. Paul Lenzini compose the committee for the preparation of the Institute's charter. Lastly the final formulation of the progress report of the Institute since its foundation is the work of the committee composed of Mr. Jack Kennedy (chairman), Mr. Bill Neuner and Mr. Milton Freeman. They will be assisted by Mr. Jack Volhard.

I would appreciate if you would give a copy of the charter of the Center for Strategic Studies to Mrs. Weyersberg in the Washington Institute.

In regard to the problems that we have recently discussed, I have already made preliminary arrangements for consultation with Dr. Schulte zur Hausen and the assistant of the Chairman of the OECD Committee. I will keep you informed as to all ensuing developments.

Dr. Schulte zur Hausen as well as the co-directors of the Institute in Frankfurt are very happy about your letter of November 19.

Dear Father McGrath:

Before I leave for my trip, I want to express my gratitude to you, Father Bunn, Father Campbell, and Dean Dean for your letter of November 19. I am going to do everything possible to further the negotiations on the reorganization of the Institute as well as on the OECD study as fast as possible.

Certainly the financial arrangement with the OECD is one of the many problems which I will negotiate in Europe. I shall try to reach an agreement along the lines mentioned in paragraph 2 of your letter. My discussions with the Department of Justice and the Department of State are quite encouraging, however, we have to realize that we deal with a novel and difficult problem. I shall keep you informed about all phases of the negotiations.

In the meantime, I express my repeated thanks for your help. I hope that our friend Schulte sur Hausen can execute his plan to be here on December 2 and 3 to acquaint himself with Father Campbell and to participate in the great event of the Convocation. The purpose of his coming is to express his continuing and deep interest in our undertakings.

I paid a farewell visit to Paul Dean and Ken Pyle yesterday, and I am convinced that we are all going to work in the most cooperative spirit.
