MEMORANDUM

TO : Rev. Brian A. McGrath, S.J.
FROM : Professor Heinrich Kronstein
RE : Institute for International and Foreign Trade Law.

In reference to our conversation of yesterday I would like to restate, as you have suggested, the two principal points which will command my attention during the next few months:

A.- Preparation of the Institute's organization.

1) The charter basically following the principles set out in the charter of the Center for Strategic Studies; but for educational reasons the charter will provide a closer contact with the University.

2) Financing of the Institute

(a) Attempt to obtain a three to five year agreement with the Dr. Schulte sur Hausengroup continuing the present grant, including fellowships, with the understanding that the Institute does not have to award the fellowships each year but only if a qualified candidate is available.

(b) Negotiations concerning U.S. funds through a group headed by Mr. Freeman of Arnold, Portas & Porter.

(c) Preparation of a budget on basis of the personal and material needs of the Institute by Father McGrath and Professor Kronstein.

B.- Preparation of the work plan for the OECD on the study of International cartels and negotiations concerning the participation of Georgetown. This step became necessary as a result of the resolution of the Committee on Restrictive Trade Practices of the OECD authorizing President Guenther to negotiate with Professor Kronstein about the details of the study.

1) Preparation of a detailed work plan as to the factual report for the OECD with the Frankfurt staff and with the assistance of Dr. Rummer and Mr. DeCurse¹, this year's Institute fellows.

2) Discussion of B.- 1) with the presently operating group of European experts and U.S. and Japanese experts to be selected.

3) Setting up of a parallel office in the Washington Institute for U.S. group of experts.

4) Financial negotiations with the OECD and Frankfurt as to the compensation for the preliminary report of 1965, the final report and the division thereof.

5) The coordination of A) and B) into a consolidated budget.

For the purpose of these negotiations on behalf of Georgetown I will need an express authorization to negotiate A.- and B.- and my status as a full faculty member in Georgetown which, as far as Imam concerned, is beyond the slightest doubt, must be freed from any cloud by a special confirmation of the University. As you know, this is necessary since unfortunately just such a cloud has arisen.

During the time of my absence, Professor Bradley, supported by Mr. DeCurse¹ and Dr. Rummer, will be responsible for the proper functioning of the Institute.

I want to use this opportunity to thank you for the excellent talk we had yesterday, and I am entering this new phase of our joint venture with great optimism. I am confident that Dean Dean will become^a most active supporter of this joint venture.
