Dear Milton:

I believe it may be helpful if I can bring to paper my suggestion how a satisfactory solution with Georgetown for the present time as well as for the future can be reached.

Gifts made by Schulte sur Hausen are at present only made from year to year. There is no obligation upon him or upon us beyond the current academic year ending June 30, 1965.

Therefore we are perfectly free to re-write the conditions under which this grant shall be extended, f.i., for a period of three years. It is my experience that the Law Center has been completely concentrated on mere legal technique under special consideration of criminal procedure. I have to agree with the Memorandum by Dean Ken Pye, that there is no one in the Law Center actually interested in the philosophical, historical, economic and legal problems in which we are engaged.

It is a structural deficiency of first class that I cannot co-operate with people as Goetz Briefs and Heinrich Rommen, both professors of the Graduate School, or with fathers engaged in research in the field of Economics, Jurisprudence and History, especially with my own former students, as Father Bayne, Father Harbrecht, Father Drinan and Father Nicholsen. Therefore we have to change the conditions of the gift to this extent that the grant does not go anymore to the Law Center but to the University to be used in an Institute advised and governed by a board composed of our former graduates and "managed" by people from the different faculties.

My suggestion is that you ask Schulte sur Hausen for the authorisation to present the University with these conditions, stating that, on the basis of our experiences this change became

necessary, and that we would appreciate if they would examine how, within the rules of this University, the Institute can be transformed into an Institute serving our ideals and our practical aims and education and research.

Thank you for everything you do.
